Julie Smith-Yliniemi Ph.D., M.P.H., L.P.C.C., N.C.C., is an assistant professor and the Director of Community-engaged research for the Indigenous Trauma & Resilience Research Center, housed in the School of Medicine and Health Sciences at the University of North Dakota. She is Ojibwe/Anishinaabe and grew up on the White Earth Indian Reservation in northern Minnesota. Her background is in health education, school counseling, grant management, along with clinical mental health therapy/diagnosis and treatment of mental health disorders. She spent several years adapting evidence-based trauma therapy models to fit with Indigenous healing practices. She co-developed and implemented the first domestic cultural immersion event with the National Board for Certified Counselors (NBCC). Her experience with research in tribal communities includes serving as the grant manager for a meth and suicide initiative grant (MSPI) for the White Earth Nation.
